Start the conversation about academics between family and student

	Make a plan to check-in regularly about schoolwork.
	Celebrate good grades. Help student address academic concerns.
	Ask for help. It is okay to not understand, or to struggle with a class or concept. Student should start getting used to asking teachers for help - that's what they're there to do!

	Open a college savings account. Your local bank can answer questions and help you open a 529 college savings plan. More information about 529 college savings plans can be found HERE.
	Take PSAT if available.
	Create a My Colorado Journey account. There is a High School Planning timeline that starts with recommendations for 7th grade. Link <u>HERE</u> .
	Set goals for high school academic performance. What are your expectation for yourself/your student?

Links to the counselors for each school's counselor pages are available on page 1 of this document. Review the Identifying Strengths worksheets with them. Ask what opportunities are available to you. Set ambitious and realistic academic expectations. Register for courses in academic areas (English, math, science, history, and foreign language) required for college entrance Try hard academically. Remember: freshman year grades affect GPA, and therefore count for college! Freshman year also sets a student's own expectations of what they are capable of, and what standard they will hold themselves to. Ask for help and support (like True North, or teachers!) Prepare for and take the PSAT 9 test. This will provide you with information on how you are doing academically, and help identify academic interests and weaknesses Explore extracurricular opportunities. Get involved in an activity (school sport, out-of-school art class, etc.) that is meaningful to you Join a club that matches your interests Volunteer for a service organizations that fits your values Continue the college conversation. Continue saving for college. Consider your summer. Can you get a job/internship or participate in a trip/activity that

could help you develop your strengths/interests?





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Continue meeting academic standards
Set goals for yourself based on your freshman year
Check-in with teachers of the classes/subjects you struggle with.
Utilize tutoring/supportive services (like True North!)
Prepare for and take the PSAT 10 test
Broaden and deepen Extracurriculars
Become more committed to a particular community service organization or project Deepen involvement in extracurricular activity/club. Become someone that teachers/leaders recognize as an active participant
Begin to consider your career
Return to Career Match Worksheet
Shadow someone in a profession you would consider
Consider your summer. In the summer, search for internships/jobs that could help you develop strengths/interests. There may be ways to help you get money for completing an internship

	Review online college catalogs/guides
	Ask favorite teachers for letters of recommendation

	Prepare for and take the PSAT test and enter the PSAT competition. Top scorers can qualify for national recognition and college scholarships.
	Prepare for and take the SAT and/or ACT
	Retake the test at least once

	On August 1, the website updates with new essay prompts. Read over them, and start thinking about what you might write about Consider starting to brainstorm/write out some ideas.
	Fill out easy info like family details, education background, activities/honors. That way, when the school year picks up, you already have the easy stuff out of the way!
	Carefully consider summer job, volunteer opportunities, internship opportunities, etc.



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Be proactive about college admissions in the first semester		
Retake SAT/ACT if you need to improve scores		
By the end of September, narrow down college choices (we recommend applying to around 5 or 6 colleges, including a "safety school." More info on our College Match worksheet.		
When scores and final college lists are ready, you can start sending official scores to the schools you will be applying to.		
As soon as you're back in school, approach teachers and confirm they can write letters of recommendation. Follow up, and make sure to have those letters of recommendation ready by late October.		
Create a tentative list of colleges for consideration (you can find our College Match worksheet here)		
Contact the colleges on your list to request information Get on their radar! Some colleges track "engagement."		
Get on their mailing lists to receive information. Click on the links!		
Prepare your personal essay and have it ready by late October.		
Prepare your supplemental essays. Have them ready by late October.		
Fill out FAFSA/CAFSA and have them ready by late October.		
Attend the Financial Aid briefing offered by True North in collaboration with local college counselors.		
Create your own Scholarship Application timeline. Which ones are you applying to? When are they due?		
Submit all applications between November and December of your senior year

Continue involvement and leadership in extracurricular activities, community service, and clubs

Follow up on your applications

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	Check your email regularly. You might receive interview requests. Respond to these in a timely manner.
	Receive and understand your EFC (Expected Family Contribution). Can your family meet that? How much will you need to make up in scholarship money?
	Apply for scholarships
	Consider admission offers and confirm your intent to enroll in April
	Request that a final transcript be mailed to your college of choice and
